
Story to Story: Discovering Belonging

Decisions, Decisions

At the threshold of a new day in a weary congregation's life, that ragtag gathering of God's people heard their leader say:

"Revere the Lord and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness...Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve...as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." (Joshua 24:14-16)

Joshua sees that the Israelites are facing their hour of decision. The time has come to decide if they want to keep up with their neighbors or stay true to their God. After all, all around them they could see nations – bigger nations, more prosperous nations, stronger nations with well-fortified military forces. These nations surround them on every side. And these nations don't worship the big "G" God of Israel. These nations worship all manner of lesser, little "g" gods.

Joshua is wise enough to know what could happen; what would happen. He knows. So, he says, "You've got to make a choice. My household and I: we're going all in with God who's gone all in for us. But it's up to you to determine how far you're willing to go, how much you're willing to give, and how much you are willing to reject of what's around you to go with this One who has gone with you all this way. You can accept or you can reject, but there isn't any middle ground; not with this God."

DEACON NOMINATIONS



Much like MIFA's vision to unite the community through service, Weave's mission is to invite everyone to start living like a weaver and shift our culture from that values achievement and individual success to one that finds value in deep relationships and community success.

Room in the Inn

Through Family Promise, hospitality and care for the homeless was a part of the ministry of Second Baptist Church for decades. Although Family Promise closed its doors in 2019, opportunities to serve and care for the homeless are still available through Room in the Inn. Volunteer opportunities include making welcome and get well cards for guests, maintaining a 55-gallon fish tank, serving meals, painting and decorating rooms for guests, beautifying the campus by maintaining raised beds and sprucing up the property, and playground pals

September Adult Sunday School Electives Beginning on the Sunday after Labor Day, our adults will have a four-week block of elective Sunday school offerings. Classes will gather in their home groups for prayers, announcements, and fellowship from 9:00-9:25, then from 9:30-10:15 have the opportunity to choose from one of three formation groups:

Why Isn't Remembering Enough to Repair?

Wednesday, August 23 at 6:00 p.m.

The National Civil Rights Museum

The Holocaust survivor Elie Wiesel did not believe in collective guilt. Instead, he asked for repair, and for holding the post-World War II generation of Germans responsible "not for the past, but for the way it remembers the past. And for what it does with the memory of the past." Other societies and communities have taken up Wiesel's call—at the national level, South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission and Argentina's efforts to prosecute Dirty War military leaders, and at the local level, movements like the Greensboro Truth and Reconciliation Commission in North Carolina and land back efforts in the Pacific Northwest. What comes after we remember, from apology and forgiveness to justice?

This event is part of a national initiative that asks the question, "How Should Societies Remember their Sins?" This is a two-year editorial and event series supported by the Mellon Foundation. Blending scholarly essays and personal stories, we will explore how societies around the world collectively remember their transgressions and make attempts at repair, and how we might imagine new paths forward.
